as investigate other funding possibilities. The results of Jackie's recent fundraising successes are outlined inside.



However, some cash is necessary to keep the things going — so we're glad to see the project gaining recognition from the region's funders and from the Lottery.

the new projects

Here are details on all the current projects -- read and wonder...

The Monks Path. This is the colloquial name for the transmoor path from Buckland Monachorum to Buckfast Abbey, so named because it was routinely used by monks travelling from one monastery to another, at a time when the monasteries were enormously powerful land owners in this area. Lynda Reynolds-Smith has been doing historical research into the Monks Path in preparation for the two-day walk along the route she will be leading in August. Along the way Lynda will provide a historical overview of the route and the landmarks along the way. The walk is scheduled for the weekend of the 5th and 6th of August. A coach will transport walkers to the start of the walk (£3 per person will cover the hire costs). We will be spending Saturday night at Nun's Cross Farm -- your overnight gear will be brought to you here. Numbers will be limited so give Lynda a ring soon if you're interested. 01364 642445

Dartmoor Profile. Local printmaker Joanna Radford is developing a collaborative printmaking/bookmaking project entitled Dartmoor Profile. She aims to use Dartmoor Profile to bring people together to make a handmade book based on participants' perceptions of Dartmoor. The finished product will be a book of unfolding pages containing writing and images. The images would be reproduced as handmade prints (etching, woodcut, linocut). Participants would either make their own prints, which Joanna would then produce in multiples, or she would be willing to take someone's drawing, painting or photograph and work with them to create an original print. The finished images can be up to 27" x 8.5" (68 cm by 22 cm). Writing can be poetry, prose, fact or fiction. Decisions regarding print type and printing methods will be discussed and determined by the participants. On the back of each of the foldout pages there will be an outline of the various profiles of the Moor. Moor Creators. This unusual project idea came from Shane Edgar and recently received support through the Millennium Festival Awards for All programme. Participants will work with local sculptor Carol Whibley to create five near life-size sculptures of the creatures which have helped to create the landscape of Dartmoor as we know it today, i.e., a man, a woman, a cow, a sheep, a Dartmoor pony. The completed creatures will be photographed in a number of locations throughout the moor -as well as being digitally installed by Shane in a number of other locations. Spot the difference! The sculptures will be the centrepiece of a photography/sculpture exhibition during the Devon Arts Forum Conference at Dartington Hall on October 31st. Plans are being made for additional tours of the exhibition and a possible publication. Dartmoor Lives & Landscapes is led by Richard Povall and Nancy Sinclair. This concept for a digital archive of Dartmoor at the turn of the millennium was developed during the original planning of The Dartmoor Project. Over the next year or so, Richard and Nancy will be documenting people and places. Much of this documentation will be in the form of video/audio recordings of people talking about the Dartmoor they love, as well as footage of the not-at-all ordinary places that make up Dartmoor. We would like volunteers to get involved with us on this (no, you don't have to commit for the entire length of the project!). If you get involved, we'll provide free training in video, audio, and interviewing skills. Each team will make mini-documentaries about the people and places they choose, with some help from Richard and Nancy. If there's someone in your community who has special remembrances about Dartmoor, or who contributes in some remarkable way to the life of the moor, or if you just love Dartmoor and would like to help record its contemporary life, then contact Richard or Nancy on 01822 890539 or via we're successful with the grants it will begin in summer 2000.

Sounding Dartmoor is a collaborative project between AHA, the University of Plymouth, DA2, and TESE (Touring Ecology of Sound Environments). This project will record a selection of the sounds of Dartmoor. Local individuals will receive training in sound recording techniques and be involved in collecting the sounds. Dartmoor Sounds will follow the model TESE is using for a series of soundscape recording on the Islands of Lewis and Harris in Scotland. Sound identification (soundmark) cards will be arriving in your mailboxes soon -- your responses will help us identify the sounds which are unique to Dartmoor, or are part of what defines Dartmoor. AHA was recently awarded £150 from West Devon Borough Council. This may not be a huge amount of money, but it is a significant award given the constraints of the Borough's available arts funding, and a 50% increase on last year's award. We are very grateful to the West Devon Borough Council for its continued support of AHA and the Dartmoor ProjectS -- and to Jackie for her work on preparing this successful application.

Jackie and Shane Edgar joined forces to write a grant application to Millennium Festival Awards for All Scheme (funded through the National Lottery). AHA has been awarded £4,960 to support the Moor Creators project outlined above. Good writing Jackie and Shane!

Again through Jackie's hard work (we'd be sunk without Jackie...) AHA has put in an application to the EC-supported Devon and West Somerset Key Fund for Dartmoor Lives & Landscapes (as a pilot-project for this community-development fund). We'll keep you posted -- we should know soon if we were successful!
